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Help Your Child Stay Safe on the Way to School

Statistics show that school buses are the safest way for children to travel to school – – even safer than riding in a car. RRPS encourages families of eligible students to have their children ride the bus. Under New Mexico law, students qualify for transportation if they live more than one mile away from an elementary school, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from a middle school, or two miles from a high school.

Parents should discuss a few basic rules with their children before school starts, in order to keep them and other children safe while walking to school or to a bus stop, at school bus stops, and while riding the bus:

Walking or riding a bike to school or to a school bus stop:

- Parents should show their children the safe walk path to use and encourage them to follow that path.
- B Obey all traffic signals, signs, and/or crossing guards. Use crosswalks where available.
- B Walk bikes through intersections
- B Walk with a buddy, if possible, and be aware of the surroundings.
- Never talk to or respond to strangers. If a stranger approaches or tries to get a child to come to him/her, the child should run home, to a neighbor's house, or another safe place such as a business, and ask an adult for help.
- Reflective material makes walkers and bicyclists more visible to street traffic.
- Always wear a helmet when riding a bike (grownups too!).

At the bus stop:

- School buses are loaded or unloaded at established school bus stops only, unless an emergency dictates otherwise.
- Parents and students should know their school bus number.
- Students should get to the bus stop at least five minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive. Running to catch the bus is dangerous and can lead to injuries.
- B While waiting for the bus, stand at least five giant steps (10 feet) away from the curb and line up away from the street.
- B Wait until the bus stops, the door opens, and the driver says it's okay before getting onto the bus.
- If you have to cross the street in front of the bus, walk on the sidewalk or along the road to a point at least ten giant steps ahead of the bus before crossing. (Better yet, cross at an intersection and use the crosswalk if one is available). Be sure that the bus driver can see you and that you can see the driver when crossing the street. Watch for traffic coming both ways.
- When being dropped off, get off the bus and walk ten giant steps away from the bus. If you need to cross the street, wait until the driver tells you it's okay before crossing in front of the bus. NEVER walk behind the bus.
- Use the handrail to enter and exit the bus.

July 23, 2008 *For Immediate Release* If you drop something near or under the bus, tell the bus driver. DO NOT ATTEMPT TO PICK IT UP because the driver may not be able to see you.

Parents are encouraged to supervise their children at all school bus stops before and after school. At some stops, parents take turns watching the children while they are waiting for or getting off the bus.

While on the bus:

- Stay in your seat and face forward. Stand up only after the bus has stopped at the bus stop or at the school.
- No eating or drinking on the bus.
- B No yelling or shouting -- it distracts the driver. Speak in a low voice. Do not talk to the driver unless necessary.
- Don't throw things while on the bus.
- Rever stick anything out of the window (arms, legs, head, bookbags, etc.).
- F Keep aisles and exits clear and personal belongings under control (backpacks, musical instruments, etc.).

Safety is everybody's business (other drivers, too!):

- Set a good example by always wearing your seat belt and making sure your children do the same.
- Watch for children when backing out of driveways, in residential areas, walking in the street, around bus stops, and especially in school zones.
- SLOW DOWN!
- Always follow the posted speed, especially in residential areas and school zones.
- **<u>No passing</u>** is permitted in school zones.
- Yellow flashing lights indicate a school bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children, so drivers should prepare to stop also.
- The <u>Red Stop Arm</u> on the side of the school bus, when extended out, means traffic in BOTH directions should <u>STOP</u> and wait until the flashing lights are turned off and the bus begins moving before proceeding. It's not only a good safety practice: IT'S THE LAW!

All Rio Rancho schools have parent pick-up/drop-off lanes for those parents who prefer to drive their children to school. Each school has specific procedures for parent drop-off and pick-up that have been carefully studied and found to be safe. Parents should familiarize themselves and their children with those procedures. Parents driving children to school must not drive through or park in the school bus lanes. This could be dangerous to students getting off of or onto buses.

During inclement weather, it is sometimes necessary to delay the start of the school day. These delays allow time for snowy or icy roads to thaw, improving safety for buses and for parents and students driving to school. An abbreviated day begins **two hours later than the regular schedule. Bus schedules are also delayed two hours.** Listen to radio stations KOB AM, KOB FM, KRST or watch TV Channels 4, 7, or 13 for the most up-to-date information.
